NEARLY HALF OF 2017 SCHOOL COMPLAINTS WERE ABOUT BLACK STUDENTS, EVEN THOUGH ONLY

OF NORTH CAROLINA PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENTS ARE BLACK

EVEN WHEN STUDENTS ARE CHARGED IN JUVENILE COURT, THOSE RECORDS AREN'T AUTOMATICALLY EXPUNGED IN N.C.—RESULTING IN A LIFETIME OF

EMPLOYMENT BARRIERS, HOUSING INSECURITY, AND ISSUES PURSUING HIGHER EDUCATION.

SCHOOL-JUSTICE PARTNERSHIPS SEEK TO REDUCE THE USE OF EXCLUSIONARY DISCIPLINE PRACTICES, SUCH AS SUSPENSION, EXPULSION, AND SCHOOL-BASED COURT REFERRALS, WHICH PUSH STUDENTS OUT OF SCHOOL AND INTO COURT.

URGE YOUR COUNTY SCHOOL BOARDS TO ADOPT SCHOOL-JUSTICE PARTNERSHIPS TO KEEP STUDENTS IN CLASSROOMS, NOT COURTS.
